
# Public Programs at the Museum

Reflections of the Little Rock Nine, 1957-2017

SEPTEMBER 26, 2017

This inspiring event honored the "Little Rock Nine," the nine African American students who bravely integrated Little Rock's Central High School in the fall of 1957. It included a moderated panel discussion and Q&A with six members of the group, who shared the circumstances leading up to their historic acts of bravery and how the experience impacted their families, changed their lives, and inspired great achievements in their careers.

## A Conversation with Ta-Nehisi Coates: We Were Eight Years in Power October 10, 2017

In this remarkable evening, writer Ta-Nehisi Coates discussed *We Were Eight Years in Power: An American Tragedy*, in which he recounts his observations as a journalist, beginning in 2008, when he went from believing that a black president was impossible to being challenged by the sudden prospect of one.
